Leadership is convening.

We are more aware than ever that human beings are living in complex systems. From the very large to the very small, traditional forms of organizing and leading are being tested and found wanting. What is missing?

Complex environments require additional leadership capacities in order for groups at any scale to find the way forward together. One of these practices is convening: calling together people around a shared purpose or inquiry to work together for community and organizational evolution.

The ART of hosting:

Convening and facilitating participation is an art, and the art of hosting is a practice that works with personal and collective capacities to bring the best from ourselves and the groups we work with. If you are a facilitator, a leader, an internal consultant, a community member, a policy maker or an educator, the practice of this art is core to your work.

What we will explore together:

- The implications of seeing the organizational and community world as a complex living system, and the benefits of working with chaos and order to generate emergent solutions and wise action.
- Key collective practices, such as conversation, inquiry and collective meaning making that support groups finding new levels of work together, scalable from one-off meetings to large scale systemic shifts.
- Change models that help us tell the story of our world now and serve as invitations to others to work collectively for change.
- Individual practices to support hosting, leading and facilitating emergence in groups, organizations and communities, especially when things are hard, or our own limiting beliefs hold us back.
- The Art of Harvesting, whereby the results of conversational processes can be put to use to support wise action.
- Tools and principles for designing initiatives that create social capital, community resilience and possibility, even in the midst of intractable challenge.

Developed as a practice, the Art of Hosting supports:

- **Resiliency:** organizations and communities become better able to deal with changes and to stay together instead of becoming overwhelmed at the scale of challenges.
- **Sustainability of efforts:** work and engagement become learning journeys rather than one-off events that “don’t seem to go anywhere.”
- **Wise action:** Participatory leadership supported by good hosting results in conversation leading to wise and strategic action.
- **Participatory planning, facilitation and engagement:** Teams, organizations and communities benefit from the diversity of voices, experiences and ideas that help facilitate evolution and co-ownership of results.
- **Creating communities of practice and moving to systems of influence:** Communities of practice support learning and help their members stay on the leading edge of work. Moving to the next scale – becoming a system of influence – is possible when a community practices together and harvests its learning well.



What the three days will be like:

The Art of Hosting is a highly experiential and participatory learning experience. Together we will examine and explore the implications of seeing the world as a living system, walking the balance between chaos and order and what such a view can contribute to our practice of facilitation and leadership.



The Art of Hosting is not a methodology, a world view or a design tool. Instead it is an approach to using these processes and in a bigger sense, to living well in a complex and ever changing world.

The Art of Hosting will take place at the Rivendell Retreat Centre on Bowen Island, BC, Canada. This is a residential retreat, offering an opportunity to deepen into your own learning and practice and to connect and learn with others. Located on 6.5 acres atop Cates Hill, with magnificent views of mountains, forest and shining sea, this residential retreat centre is designed to foster a climate of well being and contemplation, perfect for an exploration of the arts of hosting and harvesting. Location and travel routes:

Bowen Island is a 20-minute ferry ride from Horseshoe Bay, with a 30 minute drive or bus ride from downtown Vancouver. The island is also accessible by water taxi from Vancouver. Vancouver International Airport is easily accessible.

We welcome you on October 3 to register and settle in beginning at 4pm. We will eat dinner together at 6pm and meet in our opening session at 7pm. Our closing session on October 6th will end at noon and be followed by lunch.
